About 20 hours a month piloting an aircraft and 83 hours performing non flying duties.

2. Are there paid holidays?

Pilots receive about 40 days of paid holidays.

3. What kind of clothes do people have to wear?

A uniform (a jacket with trousers or skirt).

- 4. What are the 10 most important/the basic rights working people have?
 - Social security
 - · Paid holidays
 - Minimum days off: the minimum rest period before undertaking a flying duty must be:
 at least as ling as the preceding duty period or twelve hours.
 - Fair wage according to the type, size and speed of the airplane and the number of flying hours.
 - Limits on flying hours: No more than one hundred hours of flight per month or one thousand per year.
 - Physical and psychological test at 60 years of age every six month (High standard for vision, hearing, equilibrium and physical conditions).
 - Frequent and physical examinations to meet certain medical standard.
 - Extra pay for night work and for international flight.
 - A single day off must include 2 local nights and cover at least 34 hours. Consecutive days off must include a further local night (8 hours from 22.00 to 8.00 local time) for each additional consecutive days off.
 - Annually security training /within 13 months of the initial training)
- 5. What welfare benefits do you receive when somebody is losing their job? Redundancy funds (Temporary difficulties of the employer), Solidarity contract (Reduced work time)

6. What kind of qualification and diploma, certificates etc. do people need?

• Good health history with no evidence of organic and nervous diseases or mental

<u>Parental leave</u>: 6 months maximum for mother but each parent may take 5 months (maximum 11 months per child) to be taken at any time until child is 8. Paid by the state at 30% of normal earnings. Alternative option to reduce working hours by 2 hours per day during the child's first year.
